REGULATIONS on Russkiy Mir Foundation grants

1. General Provisions

1.1. The Regulations define the procedure for the approval of grants by the Russkiy Mir Foundation and control the targeted use of the provided funds.

1.2. Grants are approved in a contest for projects supporting and promoting the Russian language in the world and strengthening its position as a language of international communication and a key tool for raising the significance of the Russian Federation in the global humanitarian space.

1.3. The approval of grants is carried out consistent with the Charter of the Russkiy Mir Foundation.

2. Main Terms and Definitions

The Regulations use the following main terms:

2.1. The Foundation – the Russkiy Mir Foundation.

2.2. A grant of the Russian Mir Foundation – money disbursed by the Foundation free of charge to an organization or an establishment chosen in a grant contest for a specific project on terms defined by the Foundation with the mandatory provision of the Foundation with a report confirming the targeted use of the grant.

2.3. An application – an applicant's request for a Foundation grant composed as an online document and including a description of the project, its target audience, expected project results, a project estimate and documents confirming the relevance and demand for the project. Application requirements

are described in Clause 5 herein.

2.4. A project – an event (a series of events) aimed at specific results consistent with the Foundation statutory goals carried out within a particular period consistent with an estimate submitted in the application for taking part in a grant contest of the Foundation.

2.5. An applicant – a legal entity applying for a grant contest of the Foundation.

2.6. The Contest Expert Commission, the commission – a body set up by the Foundation for conducting a comprehensive evaluation of projects presented at the Foundation grant contest.

2.7. The grant contest, the contest – a comprehensive evaluation by members of the Foundation's grant contest expert commission of the applications and the choice of grant recipients on its results.

2.8. A grant recipient – a legal entity a project of which is chosen in the Foundation grant contest.

3. Areas of Grant Financing

The Foundation grant contest qualifications are:

3.1. Projects to be carried out abroad (or on the territory of the Russian Federation for foreign citizens, who are not naturalized by the Russian Federation and do not have a residence permit or another document confirming the right of a foreign citizen for permanent residence on the territory of the Russian Federation).

3.2. Projects the relevance of which is proven, in particular, by their compliance with the priorities of Foundation activity approved by the Foundation Supervisory Board for each calendar year. The list of priorities of Foundation activity is posted on the Foundation's official website (hereinafter referred to as the Foundation website) at <https://grant.russkiymir.ru> within a week of its approval by the Foundation Supervisory Board.

3.3. Projects consistent with one of the two thematic areas:

3.3.1. Projects aimed to promote the Russian language and Russian language learning programs abroad (unless provided otherwise) and envisaging:

a) organization of teaching the Russian language, including as foreign, and

Russian literature;

b) professional development and retraining of Russian language and literature teachers at foreign schools, universities, other educational establishments and organizations;

c) development of teaching and methodological books, teaching aids, textbooks and other publications to help foreign citizens learning the Russian language and Russian language and literature teachers;

d) development of multimedia educational resources and distant learning of the Russian language and Russian literature;

e) forums, conferences, roundtables, seminars, festivals, days of the Russian language and other events aimed to popularize the Russian language and Russian-language literature;

f) research on the Russian language and Russian literature;

g) organization and holding of Russian language and Russian literature contests and competitions;

h) popularization of the Russian language and Russian-language literature in mass media, including online media outlets and social networks;

i) support for schoolchildren and student exchange programs between foreign and Russian schools and educational organizations and establishments, summer and winter schools and language camps outside and inside the Russian Federation for foreign citizens studying the Russian language;

j) Methodological and other support for Russian schools abroad.

3.3.2. Cultural and humanitarian projects due to implemented abroad (unless provided otherwise) and envisaging:

a) scientific and educational events dedicated to Russia, domestic science and history, preservation of the memory of significant events and outstanding representatives of Russian literature, culture and history;

b) cultural and exhibition events dedicated to Russia and domestic culture and promoting higher interest in Russia and the Russian language;

c) writing and promoting popular science, educational, educational methodological and reference books about Russia, Russian culture, and the Russian

language, including those with due account of the country, regional and civilizational specifics, and promotion of Russian-language fiction books;

d) creation and promotion of audio and visual content about Russia, Russian culture, the Russian language, the Russian world and its outstanding representatives;

e) support and promotion of Russian-language media outlets, including online and other information resources;

f) preservation of Russian cultural and historical heritage;

g) events aimed to develop scientific, cultural and educational relations with foreign and international organizations stimulating higher interest in Russia and the Russian language.

4. Applicant Qualifications

4.1. Russian and foreign legal entities, including civil associations, non-governmental, educational, scientific, cultural-enlightening and religious organizations that meet all of the requirements below may apply for grants for their projects in the Foundation's contest:

a) an organization is registered no later than a year before the deadline for the submission of applications in the contest;

b) an organization is involved, consistent with its charter/statutory documents, in one or several types of activity listed in Paragraphs 3.3.1 and 3.3.2 herein;

c) an organization has experience required for the project and proven, in particular, by letters of recommendation, and personnel sufficient for the project.

4.2. There is no admission to the contest for:

a) foreign or Russian commercial organizations and corporate non-profit organizations tasked with protecting the interests of commercial organizations;

b) organizations fully funded by the federal budget (the budget of a constituent territory of the Russian Federation or a local budget) for the project indicated in the contest application;

c) organizations undergoing reorganization (excluding reorganization by joining a grant co-applicant of another legal entity), liquidation or bankruptcy

procedure;

d) organizations on the list of entities and individuals known to be involved in extremism and terrorism;

e) organizations designated as foreign agents consistent with Federal Law No. 225-FZ “On Control over Activities of Persons under Foreign Influence” dated July 14, 2022;

f) non-profit organizations the activity of which in the Russian Federation is declared undesirable consistent with Russian legislation;

g) entities listed as organizations associated with terrorist organizations and terrorists or with the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction within the framework of the implementation of powers provided for in Chapter VII of the UN Charter, by the UN Security Council or bodies specially created by resolutions of the UN Security Council;

h) organizations with an overdue debt to the Foundation as of the deadline for the submission of applications for the contest;

i) organizations that, as of the deadline for accepting applications for the contest, have not submitted to the Foundation the reports stipulated by the agreement on the allocation of a grant, the use of which has been completed (if the deadline for submitting such reports occurs before the deadline for accepting applications for participation in the contest);

j) organizations that misused funds disbursed by the Foundation or provided the knowingly false information about using a grant within seven years since the date of detection of such facts;

k) organizations approved to receive two or more grants of the Foundation for projects due in the same calendar year as of the year of the deadline for submission of applications for the contest.

5. Procedure for Applicants’ Participation in the Contest

5.1. Applicants need to submit an application in Russian to the Foundation by filling an online form on the Foundation website in order to take part in the contest.

Recommendations on filling the online form, the list and requirements for supplementary documents to be mandatory attached to the application are published on the Foundation website. Applicants may provide additional information and project documents in text files and PDF. Once an application is filed it cannot be edited.

5.2. Projects aimed to finance current (statutory) activity of the applicants with the Foundation grant are barred from the contest. These include:

a) payment of utility bills, costs of operation and repairs of buildings and structures, administrative costs unrelated to the project, banking expenses, renting an office for current operations of the entity and similar expenses;

b) purchase of buildings, structures and other real estate and movable property;

c) purchase and repairs of office equipment and machinery;

d) payment of taxes and similar mandatory payments (for instance, revenue tax, income tax);

e) purchase of communication devices and payment for mobile service;

5.3. The grant cannot compensate for such expenses as:

a) purchase of business class air tickets and SV, deluxe, sleeper car rail tickets, etc.;

b) payment for rent for residential space higher than 4* category or more expensive than the upper limit of residential rental compensation set by Russian norms and regulations (Appendix 1);

c) payment of royalties and fees except for remuneration for the development of teaching and methodological materials for teaching Russian as a foreign language;

d) compensation for entertainment and incidental expenses;

e) prizes in the monetary form.

5.4. An applicant's failure to meet the conditions specified in Clause 4 herein, as well as a failure or incomplete submission of documents listed in Clause 5.1 herein or the provision of inaccurate information about the entity, the project or persons taking part in its implementation are the absolute grounds for rejecting the

application.

5.5 Applications for the Contest are submitted within the following timeframes:

a) From April 15 through May 15 – for projects that start from November 15 of the year of application through March 14 of the year following the year of application;

b) From August 15 through September 15 – for projects that start from March 15 through July 14 of the year following the year of application;

c) From December 15 through January 15 – for projects that start from July 15 through November 14 of the year when the submission of applications ends.

5.6. The deadlines for the submission of applications for the Contest are 11:30 p.m. on May 15, September 15 and January 15, respectively. The information and documents submitted to the Foundation after the deadlines are disregarded and not subject to consideration, except for additional information and documents requested by the Foundation from an applicant.

5.7. An application submitted to the Foundation is registered and given a unique identification number. Information about the status of an application for the Contest submitted to the Foundation is published in the identification number format on the Foundation website at least five business days since the day of application.

5.8. An application submitted to the Foundation and the enclosed documents are subject to verification for compliance of the application and applicant information with the requirements of these Regulations. Applications that fail to meet the requirements of these Regulations are barred from the Contest.

5.9. At least 15 calendar days after the deadline for the submission of applications, the Foundation website publishes information in the identification number format about projects admitted to the Contest and directed to the Contest Expert Commission for an evaluation.

5.10. Applications are evaluated depending on their profile by the Contest Expert Commission for grant support for projects promoting the Russian language and supporting Russian language learning programs abroad and the Contest Expert Commission for grant support for cultural and humanitarian projects, whose

members are endorsed by the Foundation Board.

5.11. The Contest Expert Commission applies the following criteria in the evaluation of applications:

- a) compliance with Foundation statutory goals and objectives;
- b) relevance of the project, including its compliance with the priorities of Foundation activity approved by the Foundation Supervisory Board for the current year;
- c) quantitative and qualitative analysis of the project target audience, the possibility of using its results in the activity of other organizations;
- d) realistic and reasonable goals and a clear presentation of the project action plan;
- e) realistic and reasonable expenses and their correlation to anticipated results;
- f) project scale, including geography and international status of the project;
- i) an applicant's input in project resources/co-financing and partner organizers;
- j) experience and competences of performers, development prospects;
- k) opinion of Russian embassies on the project relevance;
- l) information openness of the entity, prospects for project coverage in mass media and social networks.

5.12. The commission may cut the amount of the grant requested by an applicant for the project with due account of the need for an adjustment of project results whenever necessary.

5.13. Before March 15, July 15 and November 15, respectively, the results of evaluation of applications by the Commissions and the opinion of the Foundation Supervisory Board chairman are submitted for consideration and approval by the Foundation Board in the form of a protocol signed by all members of the Commissions.

5.14. Information about results of the Foundation's evaluation of applications is published in the identification number format within six days since the time specified in Clause 5.13 herein on the Foundation website with the indication of the final rating of projects.

5.15. Whenever an application is rejected consistent with Clause 5.4 herein, the Foundation informs an applicant about violations or incompliance with the requirements. The Foundation does not inform an applicant about the evaluation and conclusions of Commission members.

5.16. The Foundation does not compensate an applicant for the costs of participation in the Contest.

5.17. A grant recipient may reject the grant if the grant amount does not allow the applicant to achieve project goals.

6. Conclusion of Agreement with Contest Winners

6.1. Projects chosen in the Contest are funded on the basis of an agreement on the allocation of a grant (hereinafter referred to as the grant agreement) concluded between the grant recipient and the Foundation.

6.2. The Foundation sends notifications to grant recipients whose projects are chosen in the Contest, indicating the amount of support and the list of documents required for the conclusion of the grant agreement.

6.3. Should a grant recipient fail to submit documents required for the conclusion of the grant agreement to the Foundation within 45 calendar days since the moment of sending the notification, the agreement with the grant recipient is not concluded and the project is deemed to be rejected.

6.4. The grant agreement concluded by the Foundation with the grant recipient must include:

- a) name of the project, goal and objectives of the project, set of project events;
- b) timeframe and stages of project implementation;
- c) amount of the grant, terms and procedure of its allocation;
- d) project estimate with grant breakdown by types of expenses;
- f) procedure for control over the use of the grant, including the composition, procedure and time for submission of the grant recipient's report on the targeted use of the grant.

6.5. The grant is credited to a transaction account indicated by the grant recipient in the grant agreement at the time and in the amount set by the grant

agreement.

6.6. The Foundation's obligations on an effective grant agreement are deemed to be fulfilled the moment the grant is credited to the bank account of the grant recipient indicated by the latter in the grant agreement.

7. Grant Spending Report

7.1. By the time specified by the grant agreement, the grant recipient must submit a report on the targeted use of the grant (hereafter a report) to the Foundation.

7.2. The report is submitted on the terms defined in the grant agreement and must contain information about the project outcome and a financial report confirming the targeted use of the grant.

7.3. The report must be supplemented with copies of payment and other primary documents confirming the actual expenses and a list of documents enclosed with the report. Copies of primary financial documents must be certified by the grant recipient and supplemented with a translation into Russian.

7.4. The grant recipient must return to the Foundation a part of the grant unused in the course of the project if any.

7.5. While processing the report, the Foundation may request additional information and documents from the grant recipient in order to have full information about the progress and outcome of the project.

7.6. The Foundation approves the report if the documents and materials provided by the grant recipient comply with the terms of the grant agreement and confirm the implementation of the project, the achievement of its goals, and the targeted use of the grant. The Foundation informs the grant recipient about the approval of the report in writing.

7.7. Obligations of the grant recipient under the grant agreement are deemed to be fulfilled the moment the Foundation approves the report.

8. Final Provisions

8.1. The Regulations take effect the moment they are endorsed by the Foundation Supervisory Board and are published on the official website of the

Foundation within ten days.

8.2. Changes and amendments to the Regulations are made by a decision of the Foundation Supervisory Board.

8.3. By submitting an application for the Contest, an applicant agrees that the Foundation will use the information provided in the application for analytical and scientific purposes and will process personal data of individuals listed in the application. The provision and processing of personal data of individuals listed in the application are carried out consistent with Russian legislation.

8.4. While working with applications, grant agreements and reports, the Foundation is guided by the laws on the protection of personal data. Information that belongs to the personal data category and is available in documents of applicants, grant agreements and reports cannot be published or passed to third parties without the consent of persons, whose personal data becomes known to the Foundation in the course of its work with applications, agreements and reports.

8.5. An applicant bears the risk of consequences of not receiving legally significant notifications sent by the Foundation to the email address indicated in the grant application.

8.6. The Foundation organizes and conducts monitoring of the projects for which it allots the grants and evaluates socially significant results of the projects.

9. Conflict of Interest

9.1. Members of the Contest Expert Commission are excluded from the processing and evaluation of applications in case they are affiliated with the applicants.
